

# **Objectives of the Study**

# **Determine**

 The lives of pre-colonial indigenous communities of south east Zimbabwe before the establishment of the Gonarezhou National Park (GNP);

#### **Discuss**

• The establishment of the GNP in relation to the eviction of locals during the colonial period;

#### **Examine**

 The nature of responses to eviction from GNP adopted by the indigenous communities at various stages of the period under review;

# **Explore**

 The tension and conflict that characterised relations between the GNP management and displaced locals;

## **Scrutinise**

 Post-colonial community empowerment programmes for the evicted locals;

## **Analyse**

 The 'Fast Track Land Reform' programme in relation to the attempts by the locals to re-claim lost ancestral lands;

## **Investigate**

 The socio-economic impact of the displacement on the livelihoods of the affected communities:

### **Provide**

 Debates about the Great Limpopo Transfrontier Park project in relation to the Zimbabwean communities who may be affected by the establishment
